SUCCESS STORIES

University of South Carolina students found several unique ways to serve with the community throughout the year.

Since traveling outside of the Columbia metropolitan area was not possible this academic year, the Leadership and Service Center offered local Alternative Break trips. Students served at Habitat for Humanity Restore, Salvation Army of the Midlands, Transitions Homeless Shelter, and other sites.

Students in Debbie Billings' SCHC 385 Equity, Justice, and Mutual Aid: Beyond Philanthropy and Charity course worked directly with Mutual Aid Midlands to address COVID-19 concerns with local residents and develop new community initiatives that will extend beyond COVID-19 related concerns. Students in this course also helped the organization win

a grant for their work.
