ENGL 101, 102 (6 hours) SPCH 140 or 230 (3 hours) Literature: One English course selected from ENGL 282-286 (3 hours) Numerical and Analytical Reasoning: MATH 122 or 141 and either math at the next higher level or PHIL 110 (6-8 hours) Two courses in behavioral sciences, elected from anthropology, sociology, psychology (6 hours) Two courses from the natural sciences including one laboratory course selected from astronomy, biology, chemistry, geology, marine science, physics (7-8 hours) One course in the fine arts* (3 hours) HIST 112 (3 hours) Foreign Languages--students shall demonstrate in one foreign language the ability to comprehend the topic and main ideas in written and, with the exception of Latin and Ancient Greek, spoken texts on familiar subjects. This ability can be demonstrated by achieving a score of two or better on a USC foreign language test. Those failing to do so must satisfactorily complete equivalent study of foreign language at USC. Two courses selected from the following fields: foreign languages, economics (other than 224), geography, government and international studies, history (other than 112), philosophy (other than 110, 111), religious studies (6-7 hours).

**Courses selected from the following areas: art, music, theatre, or creative writing. Performance courses may not apply to this requirement.*

Progression Requirements:

The requirements stated below are minimum requirements and are subject to change as stated in the last paragraph of this section. To continue in the sophomore year of the prebusiness division of the Moore School of Business, a student must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.60 on a minimum of 24 hours. The 24 hours must include ENGL 101 and 102, SPCH 140 or 230, MATH 122 or 141, and either math at the next higher level or PHIL 110, with a minimum grade of **C** in each of these courses. A student not meeting these requirements must transfer out of the prebusiness division of the Moore School of Business.

To be admitted to the upper division of the Moore School of Business, a student must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.60 on a minimum of 48 hours. The 48 hours must include ENGL 101 and 102, SPCH 140 or 230, MATH 122 or 141 and either math at the next higher level or PHIL 110, ECON 221/222, ACCT 225/226, MGSC 290, MGSC 291, and MGMT 250 or ENGL 463, with a minimum grade of **C** in each of these courses.

All majors in the Moore School of Business will be expected to pass all business administration and economics courses with a minimum grade of **C**. Students repeating a business administration or economics course more than once may not use the course toward a degree in business administration.

ENGINEERING AND COMPUTING

Core Requirements:

Common courses for the core but each separate major in the College has special requirements in the Core. Please look at the particular major in the College that you are interested in.

ENGL 101, 102 (6 hours)
Liberal Arts (12 hours)
MATH 141, 142 (8 hours)

A grade of C or better is required in ENGL 101 and 102 and MATH 141 and 142.

The liberal arts courses must, at a minimum, include one 3-hour course in history and one 3-hour course in the fine arts. Students should select liberal arts courses to complement the technical content of their curricula.

The natural science requirement of the University's general education requirements is met by the science requirements of each degree program.

Foreign Languages: students shall demonstrate in one foreign language the ability to comprehend the topic and main ideas in written and, with the exception of Latin and Ancient Greek, spoken texts on familiar subjects. This ability can be demonstrated by achieving a score of two or better on a USC foreign language test. Those failing to do so must satisfactorily complete equivalent study of foreign language at USC.

Notes:

The liberal arts courses must include at least one history course, one fine arts course, and one professional development course. The department maintains a list of acceptable history, fine arts, and professional development courses..

The laboratory science courses are to be with laboratory and may be chosen from biology, chemistry, geological sciences, marine science, and physics.

ECIV requirements include one course from each of four areas: environmental, geotechnical, structures and transportation, and water resources. ECIV electives are chosen from additional courses offered in the department. The department maintains lists of courses for each area.
