



TRANSFER CREDIT GUIDE: MIDDLE LEVEL EDUCATION

If you are a South Carolina technical college student who plans to transfer to the University's College of Education, to pursue *a major in Middle Level Education*, you should consider the following courses as you schedule your technical college classes. The courses listed below will transfer to one of these degrees. This list does not include every technical college course which is available for transfer to the University of South Carolina. You are not required to take all courses listed prior to transferring. Rather, it is a guide for you and your advisors.* You should be aware that courses must be passed with *a grade of C or higher* in order to be considered for transfer credit. *The Middle Level Education program leads to SC teacher certification for grades 5 through 8 in two concentration areas chosen from English, Social Studies, Mathematics, and Science.

Technical College Courses

USC College of Education Course Requirements

Liberal Arts Core:

- 1) ENG 101 and 102
- 2) HIS 201 or 202
- 3) PSC 201
- 4) GEO 102
- 5) One course from: ECO 201, ECO 210, ECO 211
- 6) SPC 205

Mathematics and Natural Science:

- 1) MAT 165 or 120
- 2) MAT 130
- 3) BIO 105 or 112
- 4) One course from: PHS 101, AST 101, CHM 112, CHM 107, CHM 110

Liberal Arts Core (24 hours):

- 1) ENG 101 and 102
- 2) HIST 111 or 112
- 3) POLI 201
- 4) GEOG 121
- 5) One course from: ECON 221, ECON 222, ECON 224
- 6) SPCH 140

Mathematics and Natural Science (16 hours):

- 1) STAT 201
- 2) MATH 122
- 3) Life Science - BIOL 110 or 120
- 4) Physical Science

*There are other options and/or additional requirements for completing these sections, depending on degree and emphasis chosen. The courses listed will count in all Middle Level degree programs at USC-Columbia regardless of degree or emphasis.

Note: If you are transferring from Midlands Technical College or Orangeburg-Calhoun Technical College, you should also ask your technical college advisor about the Pathways Project. This is a collaborative program for students at these institutions considering transferring into an Education Program at USC-Columbia.
