- Regardless of individual course grades, students must maintain a minimum 2.000 cumulative overall GPA.
- Some colleges require a minimum GPA for major courses. Courses indicated in this column are included in the major GPA for this program of study.
- Students in the College of Arts and Sciences are required to demonstrate proficiency in one foreign language equivalent to the 122 course through course credit or the corresponding Foreign language placement score.
- The [Carolina Core](#) provides the common core of knowledge, skill and academic experience for all Carolina undergraduate students.
- The College of Arts and Sciences requires one U.S. History and one non-U.S. History course, both of which must be chosen from the approved Carolina Core GHS courses. Whichever is not fulfilled through the Carolina Core GHS requirement must be fulfilled through this college requirement.
- The cognate is intended to support the course work in the major. The cognate must consist of twelve hours of courses at the advanced level, outside of, but related to the major. In place of a cognate, a student may choose a minor consisting of at least 18 credit hours of courses concentrated in one area that follow a structured sequence. A second major eliminates the minor/cognate requirement.
- No courses of a remedial, developmental, skill-acquiring, or vocational nature may apply as credit toward degrees in the College of Arts and Sciences. The College of Arts and Sciences allows the use of the Pass-Fail option on elective courses. Further clarification on inapplicable courses can be obtained from the College of Arts and Sciences.
- A list of courses that fulfill the following major categories is available on the [Department of Anthropology](#) webpage. The Carolina Core Integrative course is fulfilled through one of the following: ANTH 319 (archaeology), ANTH 355 (linguistic), ANTH 364 (biological), or ANTH 581 (sociocultural).

### Program Notes:

- Courses identified as “critical” must be completed in the student’s first 60 semester hours of work in order for these courses to be credited toward graduation.
- A “Departmental Undergraduate Research Track (DURT)/Intensive Major” is available to students majoring in Anthropology who wish to participate in significant research activities in collaboration with, or under the supervision of, a faculty mentor. The required courses include all courses from the Anthropology major, with the exception that only two Anthropology Electives are required, plus students must complete: a Fieldschool, Laboratory, Practicum, Qualitative Methodology or Quantitative Methodology course; and ANTH 201 – Anthropological Inquiry in Undergraduate Research or an additional 500-level course. Additional hours include ANTH 498 – Senior Thesis and another 500-level ANTH course for a total of 33 hours in the major. Further requirements include: 1) a minimum major GPA of 3.3, 2) a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.30, 3) public presentation of the Senior Thesis in a venue approved by the faculty mentor (such as the annual meeting of the Southern Anthropological Society, a regular or special session of the Department of Anthropology Colloquium Series, USC Discovery Day, or Submission to a professional journal), 4) a written sponsorship agreement from the faculty mentor to be placed on file in the Department of Anthropology office.
- The last 30 credit hours toward your degree must be earned in residence at the University of South Carolina-Columbia.
