- Regardless of individual course grades, students must maintain a minimum 2.000 cumulative GPA.
- Some colleges require a minimum GPA for major courses. Courses indicated in this column are included in the major GPA for this program of study.
- Students in the Global Studies Program are required to complete 6 hours of a foreign language at the 300-level or higher.
- The [Carolina Core](#) provides the common core of knowledge, skill and academic experience for all Carolina undergraduate students.
- The College of Arts and Sciences requires one U.S. History and one non-U.S. History course, both of which must be chosen from the approved Carolina Core GHS courses. Whichever is not fulfilled through the Carolina Core GHS requirement must be fulfilled through this college requirement.
- 24-27 hours of Global Studies courses. Any courses used to fulfill major requirements may not also fulfill other degree requirements (minor, cognate, Carolina Core) or count toward an additional major.
 - Global Concentration: Leadership in the Global Economy** (15-18 hours)
 - Students must select one of the following options (3-6 hours):
 - ACCT 222 – Introduction to Accounting or
 - RETL 261 – Functional Accounting I *and* RETL 262 – Functional Accounting II
 - Students must select one course from four of the following categories (12 hours):

 - Social Work:** SOWK 306, SOWK 307
 - Women’s Studies:** WGST 352, WGST 381
 - World Region** – Three courses (9 hours) selected from one of the following area studies groups. (See entries for minors in these areas in the undergraduate [Bulletin](#) for lists of approved courses. Special Topics courses with appropriate content may be applied to the world region requirement with approval of the advisor.)
 - African Studies
 - Asian Studies
 - European Studies
 - Middle East and North Africa (Islamic World Studies)
 - Latin American Studies
 - Russian and Eurasian Studies

Note: Students are strongly encouraged to spend a period of time overseas, preferably in a country where they can develop their language skills.

Participating in a study abroad program or an overseas work experience are two ways to gain an international experience. A period of a semester or full year is most beneficial. Approved study abroad courses may apply to some Global Studies major requirements, with permission of the advisor & the college.

- The cognate is intended to support the course work in the major. The cognate must consist of twelve hours of courses at the advanced level, outside of, but related to the major. In place of a cognate, a student may choose a minor consisting of at least 18 credit hours of courses concentrated in one area that follow a structured sequence. A second major eliminates the minor/cognate requirement.
- No courses of a remedial, developmental, skill-acquiring, or vocational nature may apply as credit toward degrees in the College of Arts and Sciences. The College of Arts and Sciences allows the use of the Pass-Fail option on elective courses. Further clarification on inapplicable courses can be obtained from the College of Arts and Sciences.

Program Notes:

- Courses identified as “critical” must be completed in the student’s first 60 semester hours of work in order for these courses to be credited toward graduation.
- The last 30 credit hours toward your degree must be earned in residence at the University of South Carolina-Columbia.
