- Regardless of individual course grades, students must maintain a minimum 2.000 cumulative GPA.
- Some colleges require a minimum GPA for major courses. Courses indicated in this column are included in the major GPA for this program of study.
- Students in the College of Arts and Sciences are required to demonstrate proficiency in one foreign language equivalent to the 122 course through course credit or the corresponding foreign language placement score.
- The [Carolina Core](#) provides the common core of knowledge, skill and academic experience for all Carolina undergraduate students.
- The College of Arts and Sciences requires one U.S. History and one non-U.S. History course, both of which must be chosen from the approved Carolina Core GHS courses. Whichever is not fulfilled through the Carolina Core GHS requirement must be fulfilled through this college requirement.
- The cognate is intended to support the course work in the major. The cognate must consist of twelve hours of courses at the advanced level, outside of, but related to the major. In place of a cognate, a student may choose a minor consisting of at least 18 credit hours of courses concentrated in one area that follow a structured sequence. A second major eliminates the minor/cognate requirement.
- History major courses include:
 - 1 course from U.S. History 300-level or above (3 hours)
 - 1 course from European History 300-level or above (3 hours)
 - 1 course from World History 300-level or above (3 hours) –Select from African, Middle Eastern, Asian, or Latin American History
 - Chronological Breadth (overlay: the same courses that fulfill these requirements may also fulfill other major requirements)
 - 1 course that substantially covers pre-modern societies (3 hours)
 - 1 course that substantially covers modern societies (3 hours)
 - Senior Seminar or Thesis (3 hours): HIST 497 – Senior Seminar, HIST 498 – Senior Seminar, or HIST 499 – Senior Thesis (SCHC 499 Honors Thesis may substitute if this thesis is directed by a member of the history faculty)
 - 4 additional history electives 200-level or above (12 hours): The Assistant Chair and Undergraduate Director will determine into which groups specific History courses fall in consultation with the faculty member teaching the class. The Undergraduate Committee of the History Department must approve exceptions to the distribution requirements.
- No courses of a remedial, developmental, skill-acquiring, or vocational nature may apply as credit toward degrees in the College of Arts and Sciences. The College of Arts and Sciences allows the use of the Pass-Fail option on elective courses. Further clarification on inapplicable courses can be obtained from the College of Arts and Sciences.

Program Notes:

- Courses identified as “critical” must be completed in the student’s first 60 semester hours of work in order for these courses to be credited toward graduation.
- Students who fulfill the requirements for the general major may earn a B.A. with Distinction upon the completion of the following additional requirements: 1) Declare their intention to pursue a degree with distinction before the beginning of their senior year (before beginning the last 30 units of the undergraduate degree); 2) Have a minimum 3.60 GPA in the major and 3.5 overall GPA at the time of declaration of intent and maintain these GPA requirements; 3) Complete an additional 9 hours of History courses at the 200-level or higher (only 6 hours of 200-level History courses may count towards the requirements for the major and graduation with distinction); 4) Notify the professor of their Senior Seminar or Thesis course in writing by the end of the first week of class that they intend to pursue a degree “with distinction” and complete to the professor’s satisfaction the additional research necessary for work “with distinction”; 5) Public presentation of their research at Discovery Day. (Students who want a degree “with distinction” from the History Department and a degree “with honors from the South Carolina Honors College” must complete two separate research projects.
- The last 30 credit hours toward your degree must be earned in residence at the University of South Carolina-Columbia.
