Welcome to Introduction to Economics. Some students come into an economics course with misconceptions on what economics is and what economists do. What we will *not* do in this course is provide you with tips on stocks and the stock market. What we will talk about is incentives and decisions that individuals, businesses, and societies must make. While some areas of economics focus on the stock market, it can also be used to help us make daily decisions. We must weigh the benefits and costs of every decision we make; when a student chooses to attend class they must give something up, whether it is working at a part-time job or shopping with friends. Economics helps us better understand that decision-making process. This

course will give you an introduction to economic concepts and help you better grasp how economics can be used in our everyday lives.

To ensure you get all you can from this course it is important to read lectures, complete the readings and LearnSmarts, use the supplemental videos and check your understandings, and ask questions during office hours. If you find yourself struggling with the material contact me as soon as possible. I also encourage you to come into the course with an open mind, even if you have had a bad experience in the past or heard horror stories from others. I want to assure you that I will do my best to make economics interesting and relevant to you.

Finally, it is important to recognize any problems or issues you are having early in the semester. If I am not made aware of a problem, I cannot be of any assistance. Keep track of your grades and progress throughout the semester and ask for help when it is needed.



Have you taken an online course before?

Online courses come with different sets of benefits and challenges compared to traditional lectures. The benefits of this course include “attending class” at a time that is convenient for you, the ability to watch a confusing lecture multiple times, and having access to the internet and other resources during lectures and exams. 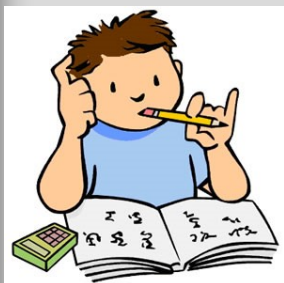

Required Course Assignments and Exams

Sections: This course is divided into 7 sections. The sections, along with release and due dates are listed in the course schedule. In addition to the 7 sections there is one additional worksheet and a final exam that can be used to replace your lowest score on the worksheet and exam.

Schedule: All sections will open on the first day of class, you may access the assignments at any time, but there are set due dates for the worksheets and exams. All assignments are due at 11:59pm on the date listed in the syllabus. More information on the exams will be posted as the release date approaches.

Worksheets: Worksheets and Exams are distributed through Blackboard and Connect. You may enter either system to access the assessments.

The Worksheets are not timed and you have the opportunity to exit the assignment and reenter. You will have two attempts for each worksheet. Each worksheet will be worth 20 points, for a total of 140 points or 28.3% of your final grade. The course contract completed at the start of the semester is worth 5 points or

1% of your final grade.

Exams: Exams are timed, based on the number of questions and whether any questions require calculations. You will only have one attempt to complete an exam. When clicking on the exam, both in Blackboard and Connect, your time will begin counting down. Your time will continue to count down even if you are not logged into the system. Once you have entered the exam be sure to complete all questions. **The instructor will not extend the time or reopen an exam that has been opened by the student, even if it was an accident.** This policy is put in place since students who open the assessment have the opportunity to view the questions. If you accidentally open an exam or

have a computer issue that occurs while completing the exam you should plan to complete the final exam as a replacement. Each exam is worth 50 points, for a total of 350 points or 70.7% of your final grade.

Extensions: Due to the length of time that assessments are opened there are no make-up or extensions for the assignments. If you do have a medical issue that caused you to miss the entire time the assignment was open submit a doctor's note for consideration. Keep in mind there is one replacement worksheet and one replacement exam that may be used for any missed work for the course.

Message from IT on Online Testing

Students taking tests should be sure they are using a browser that works well with Blackboard – we recommend Mozilla Firefox or Google Chrome. Other browsers may have inconsistent results, especially while taking tests. The second thing is that they must be sure they have a strong connection to the internet – a wired network connec-

tion is preferred, but if they are using wireless, they should be as near to the wireless broadcasting system as possible to get a strong connection.

If students are getting other errors on Blackboard, they should contact the **UTS Service Desk at 803-777-1800** and report the error. We can

then follow up to determine what exactly may have occurred – if it was a Blackboard error or a computer error.

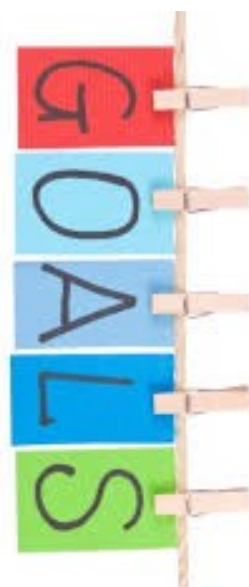
