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USC Lancaster Faculty Meeting Minutes October 4, 2024

CALL TO ORDER: 12:35 PM, D. Lawrence

CORRECTION/APPROVAL OF MINUTES: The minutes of the September 6, 2024 faculty organization meeting were approved.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS:

Dean of the Campus – Dr. Courtney Catledge, report submitted (Appendix 1).

- Current enrollment is 2572
- Followed up on Dual Enrollment discussion at September's FO meeting and shared some personal impacts of dual enrollment
- Highlights from her report:
 - Faculty/staff searches for open Indian Land coordinator and Instructor of Statistics
 - Encourages faculty/staff turnout at Athletics events
 - Encourages fac/staff turnout at upcoming events
 - Noted Scholarship Luncheon (watch for email invitation, RSVP is important)
 - o Noted funding/grants
 - Discussion with Columbia campus about free speech (policies, reactions to demonstrations, etc.), she wants USCL to have a say in how we handle on our campus
 - o 30 internship stipends have been approved for the semester
 - o Reminder to RSVP for Palmetto College social in November
 - o Celebrate record enrollment, thanks to faculty and staff
- Thanks to fac/staff who were flexible and offered support to the campus community and to those affected by Hurricane Helene recently

Questions and/or Comments:

- S. Alhaddad Who designated the Rose Garden as the campus free speech zone?
- C. Catledge This has not been widely communicated. We should not wait until we have a challenge to identify policies and places. We should have more discussions about this.

*This question prompted discussion of campus free speech and policies.

Questions included whether security should have been able to interfere with student

demonstrations by relocating demonstrations if there are no clear, written policies or rules in place, as well as what constitutes "protest."

C. Bundrick – Any updates about the campus Dean search?

Courtney: The position has gone through the development and approval process, has been approved, the posting should be up within 2-3 weeks

A. Golonka – Regarding the publicized student-organization sponsored event in Columbia, what do we do when students feel threatened by others' expressions of free speech?

C. Catledge: Those events probably prompted the current system-wide conversation about free speech. More discussion is needed.

Associate Dean for Academic and Student Affairs – Dr. Todd Lekan, report submitted (Appendix 2).

- Highlights from his report including:
 - o Encouraging fac/staff to attend the scholarship luncheon, extend grace to students late to class because of the luncheon
 - o Al is a big conversation. Perhaps a need for an ad hoc committee on how we handle this
 - Reminder to use the Early Alert notices. Think about students who might need to get out of full-term classes and into 8-week classes.
 - o Oct. 21 is registration for Spring and Fall 2 start date.
 - o Sarah Sellhorst is taking on additional duties re: USCL Dual Enrollment curricula and high school instructors, onboarding, etc.
 - Our BIT CARE Team is here for students who need more support, but remember that immediate crises should be routed to emergency services (then follow up with a BIT CARE Team report)
 - o Faculty searches
 - o Faculty Expert "Speakers Bureau" a list of topics that faculty would be willing to present on for community groups (see his report for details)
 - Expect a survey about faculty advising do those who already do it want to continue, do others want to take part?
 - Shout out to Zoe Byrd for being selected to serve on the Discovery School board
 - Highlighted our many faculty and staff accomplishments! See the Service Spotlights and Faculty Teaching/Scholarship accomplishments in his report

Questions and/or Comments: None

Director of Academic Success Center — Dr. Patrick Lawrence, report submitted (Appendix 3)

- The ASC is doing well, the charts in his report show that trends are holding (including a new chart that breaks out athlete and dual enrollment student use)
- Highlights that now is the time for ASC to recruit tutors: Instructors are encouraged to refer exceptional students to help
- ASC is partnering to help travel-study students with applications for their Gilman Scholarship. Faculty are encouraged to reach out with ideas or opportunities for similar partnerships.

Questions and/or Comments:

- T. Scarlet: Does the ASC offer help with reading comprehension? Or could you offer an event to address that concern?
- P. Lawrence: Attendance may be a concern for a special event with that focus, but the ASC does tutor in study skills so we could develop that further.
- S. Alhaddad (follow-up question): If a student has a question about reading comprehension in a specific class, should they book with a content-area tutor or a writing tutor?
- P. Lawrence: Suggests opting for writing or study skills. Those sessions do not teach discipline-specific material, but help students build their study skills to learn in the future.
- B. Obi-Johnson: Is there a procedure where the ASC might reach out to a corresponding faculty member to inform them that tutors were unable to help a student?
- P. Lawrence: We can help connect students to faculty, but we encourage students to advocate/communicate for themselves.
- J. Castiglia: Students have said that tutors are booked for prolonged periods, how can we request those specific disciplines?
- P. Lawrence: Some subjects are in extremely high demand. The ASC's scheduler only makes appointments 2 weeks in advance to avoid no-shows or cancellations, so it looks like appointments are unavailable beyond that window.
- J. Castiglia (Follow-up question): Is it possible to create a waitlist for high-demand subjects?
- P. Lawrence: Will need to explore options.

Director of Human Resources – Tracey Mobley Chavous, report submitted (Appendix 4)

- October is Open Enrollment. She will send many updates. If you do not want changes to your coverage, you do not need to do anything, except for flexible spending accounts.
- Most changes can go through MyBenefits website except for changes to optional life insurance coverage, which must be made on paper
- Visit the PEBA website (linked in her report) for information
- The next observed holiday is Election Day. Campus will be open but there are no classes. Please remind students that they do not need to come to campus (unless they want to), and to remember the Polling locations will be open 7 AM to 7 PM. All employees are encouraged to vote before or after work, but there is some leeway available for employees at a significant distance that would prevent them from voting
- Reminder that we are prohibited from using University resources for the promotion of political candidates or campaigns (employees can absolutely do this privately, but should not use university emails or other resources)
- Reminder of the campus closure for Thanksgiving, winter break, etc. (see her report for details on the changes to class schedules this year)

N. Lawrence: Clarified that the point about tenure transferability within PC refers to faculty transferring tenure status from one campus to another.

- S. Penuel supported holding out about instant transfer due to surprising differences between campus expectations for T&P.
- C. Bundrick expressed concern regarding the point about academic deans in T&P procedures given how complex and time-intensive the process already is; and offered a reminder that charges do not always have to be accepted.

- Council met on Sept 25, discussed addressing Al and student cheating; hope to offer a student event (a panel with student participation, emphasis on educating what constitutes cheating/misconduct)
- Discussed how to get students to stay on campus longer, campus culture. We need more feedback about what students want and need. We'd like to have a faculty listening session to gather faculty feedback
- Discussed a possible new policy to limit student summer hours so they don't overload themselves during those short semesters. There would be an option for an override with approval

2. Artificial Intelligence and Academic Integrity. I have noticed an increased number of integrity violations based on student usage of AI. For example, AI was cited by professors reporting 11 of the 12 findings in the 2024 summer terms. The USC Office of Student Conduct & Academic Integrity continues to look closely at issues related to the use of Artificial Intelligence in courses and has developed a page with some helpful FAQs. - 5. Fall 2 and Spring/Summer Registration. October 21 is the date that fall 2 courses begin. If you know of students who might benefit from dropping a full semester class while recovering in the second eight weeks, please encourage them to talk with their advisors. October 21 is also the date that students begin registering for spring and summer courses. Thanks to faculty for working with

Division Chairs to develop a viable spring/summer 2025 schedule in a timely manner.

- **6.** Faculty, Curricula, and Courses in USCL Dual Enrollment. Given the considerable growth and complexity in the dual enrollment program we have assigned duties pertaining to faculty and curricula oversight to Dr. Sarah Sellhorst. USC Sumter has implemented this academic oversight role for some time. Dr. Sellhorst oversees the instruction in the dual enrollment program including instructor vetting, onboarding, evaluation, and compensation. She also works with the USCL staff and school partners on course schedule planning.
- 7. Students Dealing with Hurricane Issues. Thanks for working with those students who are struggling with difficulties such as power outages and flood conditions caused by the hurricane. If you are concerned about a student's safety or wellbeing, please consider reporting the matter to the Care team.
- **8. CARE** (**Student Care and Outreach Team**). The Care Team is a group of caring professionals dedicated to student success and well-being by identifying concerns, addressing those concerns with the student, and referring them to campus and community resources. The Care Team's primary goal is to ensure that the student involved gains the necessary resources to remain successful academically and personally at USCL. If you think the student is an immediate threat/danger to themselves or others call 911. It is a good idea to follow that up with a CARE report. For other situations that are more like "yellow alerts," err on the side of caution and file the report. When the report is received, the reporter will get a notification that the report is received. The Associate Dean will communicate with the CARE Team to implement an action plan.

- **9. Faculty Searches**. A search committee has been assembled for an Instructor/Assistant Professor of Statistic faculty member: Andy Yingst (Chair), Annette Golonka, Jerrod Yarosh, Evan Nooe.
- **10. Faculty Expert "Speakers Bureau."** Recently, a staff member at the Tree Tops retirement community mentioned to me that her residents would enjoy public lectures on topics of interest presented by faculty experts. - 11. Faculty Advising for Spring 2025. Faculty advising is a central part of our two-tiered advising system at USCL. Staff advisors work students in their first year, helping them learn how to be a college student, select appropriate courses, and get involved. Ideally, students are assigned faculty advisors in the spring semester of their freshman year. Faculty advisors help students plan their second-year course schedules as well as offer advice about their next paths beyond USCL. Sometime in the next month, full-time faculty will receive a message asking them to affirm their intention to continue or to begin advising in spring 2025. In November, we will offer faculty a few meeting options to discuss advising prior to the spring term.
- **12. Zoe Byrd, USCL Academic Advisor,** along with 11 other advisory members, was selected by parents and staff of Discovery School to serve on the 2024-2025 Advisory Board. Discovery School is a public charter elementary school in the Lancaster County School District. • Lauren Thomas and Sarah Sellhorst will partner with the Upper Midlands Rural Health Network to facilitate a two-year Strategic Workforce & Training grant with the SC Center for Rural and Primary Healthcare to develop and accredit a Health & Wellbeing Coach Training Program through the USC Lancaster.

The training program will equip students interested in a future health profession with the preventive health knowledge and patient-centered communication skills to increase their likelihood of sustaining self-directed health-promoting behaviors. The grant will also offer tuition funding for select students who fully participate in the pilot year of the 100% online training program.

Recent and Upcoming Events Overview

In September, the ASC held two review sessions for nursing subjects (BIOL 243 and NURS 216) as part of our suite of studio services. The sessions were led by peer-tutors Caysen Horton and Kennedy Bumbrey and served 24 students. We'll continue running these throughout the semester in coordination with faculty.

The ASC is partnering with Dr. Susan Cruise to assist travel-study students with applications for the Gilman Scholarship to cover their travel costs. If you are working with a student group that could benefit from ASC services, please know that we have many support offerings for non-course-related projects.

The ASC was host to the RPS Executive Committee grant-writing workshop on October 27th. Hurricane Helene's impacts required moving the event to a hybrid format, and while some attendees met in-person in the Studio, others participated via Teams. A total of 9 people attended the hourlong event.

Summary of Tutoring Data

Year-to-year trends: The ASC feels very busy this semester, and the charts below show both that we are holding a high number of appointments (141 in September) and that we are up slightly over past years in total student contacts. These are the typically high numbers that we see early in the fall semester and may diminish over time.

Session distribution trends: Session distribution numbers reflect a very high number of students in Studio services, particularly but not exclusively in the two Health Sciences events mentioned above. Initial data about use of ASC services by athletes and dual-enrollment students indicate that these students use the center at much lower rates than the general student body. Student athletes represented only 4% of clients, while dual enrollment students were 6%. These are both potential growth areas for us, as we believe that both groups could benefit from ASC support. Course distributions were typical, with the largest share in STEM, especially Math 111i and BIOL 243.





INFORMATION ITEMS:

1) 2024 Open Enrollment

Open Enrollment for benefits begins on October 1, 2024, and ends on Thursday October 31, 2024. Any changes made during Open Enrollment will take effect on January 1, 2025.

I sent an email containing details about the changes available during Open Enrollment and additional resources to the Lancaster campus on October 1, 2024. The subject line is Open Enrollment for Benefits.

All subscribers are encouraged to make open enrollment changes by using the MyBenefits website located at https://mybenefits.sc.gov.

**Request for increases to Optional Life Insurance Coverage must be submitted on a paper Notice of Election (NOE) Form. **

If you are satisfied with your current coverage, you do not need to do anything during Open Enrollment. However, you must re-enroll in MoneyPlus flexible spending accounts each year.

Highlights for 2025

- Active employee and funded retiree health insurance premiums will not increase in 2025.
- Permanent, part-time teacher, partially funded retiree, non-funded retiree, COBRA subscriber, survivor and former spouse health insurance premiums will increase in 2025.
- Supplemental Long-Term Disability (SLTD) monthly premium factors will decrease in 2025.
- Apply for SLTD or change your SLTD benefit waiting period for existing coverage without medical evidence.
- Normal Plan provisions (copayments and coinsurance) will apply to members who receive care at a Patient-Centered Medical Home (PCMH).
- Members will pay the applicable brand copayment for higher-cost diabetic products and supplies, such as continuous glucose monitors and insulin pumps. No-Pay Copay participants will pay a reduced copayment for these higher-cost products and supplies.
- Supplies and drugs to treat diabetes will not be eligible for the No-Pay Copay program for Savings Plan members.
- A new tobacco cessation program will offer participants an option of live interactive online sessions or a self-paced structured program.

Faculty Organization Report

October 4, 2024

Committee Members:

The committee has met twice. During the first meeting on September 24, Rebecca Freeman was elected chair of the committee. We discussed two items of business from the previous year and one new item. We also discussed the suggestion of the committee committing to watch and report to the Lancaster Faculty Organization any curricular changes and other relevant news from Columbia.

During the second meeting on October 2, the committee voted in favor of a couple of proposals that were discussed in the previous meeting.

- The first item was a proposed change to the Association in Science Business degree that recommends that the CMS requirement be switched from just SPCH 140 or 230 to any CMS course. Currently this is being done on an individual basis.
- The second item is to update the listings of CHEM 107 and CHEM 111 in the associate degree's worksheets to include the required labs. The purpose is to make the corresponding labs more obvious to students.
- The third item is a proposed change to the associate in science degree plan.
 Currently students cannot receive ARP credit for MATH 111, MATH 111i, and MATH 115. The proposed change would allow students to receive credit for all three.

Evaluation Committee report for 10/4 USCL FO Meeting

Evaluation has met a couple of times since August to discuss how best to carry out the chair's charge from March:

"Chair charges the Evaluation, T&P, and Instructor committees to meet together to discuss and clarify before the form is brought back to the floor for a vote. Confirm deadlines from handbook and clarify on forms."

The chairs of Evaluation, T&P, and Instructor Peer Review Committees met September 23 to discuss which approaches to post-tenure that best served each committee and, with the results of that very productive meeting in mind, Evaluation is in the process of drafting a document that clarifies and defines key aspects of the post-tenure process.

We hope to have something ready to present in the form of a motion to the faculty before the end of the year.



Native American Studies Advisory Committee Report to the Faculty, October 4, 2024

Native American Studies Advisory Committee members:

Allan Pangburn, Patrick Lawrence, Debbie Rowell, Stephen Criswell, Ernest Jenkins, Bettie Obi Johnson, Evan Nooe (chair). Garane Garane, Logan Cocklin, Brittany Talor-Driggers.

The Native American Studies Advisory Committee held its first meeting on Sept. 16.

- The committee confirmed selection of a chair (Evan Nooe).
- The committee reviewed internal course developmental materials and introduced an external consulting review of developmental course materials.

A major charge of the Native American Studies Advisory Committee has focused on curriculum development centered on the collaborative creation of a new course tentatively titled "Introduction to Native American Studies." Initial planning intends to submit curriculum materials for consideration as a PCAM course.

The Native American Studies Center and the Native American Studies Advisory Committee welcome feedback and guidance on institutional course review procedures.

The next Native Americans Studies Advisory Committee is scheduled for Oct. 7 at 2:00PM via Zoom.

The **President's Report** provided a general overview of what he discussed during the General Faculty meeting. The current enrollment of U of SC is approximately 38,000 students and will hopefully reach 40,000 within the coming years. There has been an increase in funding/awards/grants from past years. There has also been \$131 million a 63% increase in funding over last year and are coming back to prepandemic levels. Currently there has been the hiring of 100 new Tenured or Tenure Track faculty 49 last year, and 51 to happen this year. These are new positions beyond replacement, so a net increase. Additionally, 200 faculty had salary adjustments. There was a brief mention of a master plan and is progress in updating and improving the campus such as housing. It is currently in phase zero which seemed to just mean the starting phase and it will take approximately 2 years (the whole plan or the current phase was a bit unclear). The plans is online so on can read about the improvements that are planned. The president address the September 18th event that is being sponsored by a Student group who is inviting a controversial speaker(s)/organizer to the campus. He made it clear that the event is not endorsed by the University. But also made it clear that First Amendment rights need to be supported and the rights of the students/speakers. There was a brief outline of what the university could do or not do and the general outcome was that while safety is paramount the event cannot be cancelled on the possibility of such an outcome at the current stage. Extra police will be there to maintain safety. While the Carolinian creed is may seem counter to the spirit of the event, it is aspirational in what to do and who to be. Thus as it is not policy the event will take place. No questions were raised.

The **Provost's Report** provided a general overview of the talks they have had with departments and faculty during their listening tour. Of note was that student retention is at a record 92%. The goal is to reach 94% to match and exceed other peer institutions. Of students who do not continue directly to their second year only 2% come back and earn a college degree. The Provost then gave a list of things we as faculty can do to help increase retention: Provide an early graded assignment (within the first 4 weeks) so that students can gauge if they can succeed in the course; Provide information and direct students to resources like the First Gen Center; And a reduction in DFW rates through Circle-In. Circle-In is a virtual peer led learning platform where students enrolled in selected courses have access to the platform where they can share notes, answer class related questions, and more. Susan Sutton a nursing faculty (unclear if they were a UofSC or not faculty member) discussed the reason why they like the program. The CEO is very responsive to feedback/issues; Open to hearing new ideas from faculty; Any student who is registered in that class can be a part of it; It is an anytime anywhere platform. Gerald Megget (CEO of Circle-In): Gave an overview of what the platform is and how it helps students stay engaged and succeed in their courses. Provided statistics showing usage and how they are in over 10 states and growing at peer-institutions. In general it is a virtual peer-led learning platform, like a large scale study group. Its main driver is through gamification/points where students increase their totals by answering questions or sharing notes, and flashcards, etc. It is a new way to open a pathway and to create sense of community and belonging in the students learning journey. A few questions were raised. Questions: 1-What were the results of the pilot study, and what options were there for those not in the program? Currently that data is not analyzed and just the traditional means. 2-Does this drive down the use of AI? The hope is that it does and was supported by anecdotal evidence. 3-Is there anything being done about the Hold Policy where students are not allowed to drop classes if they own the university money? It is being reviewed and discussions are ongoing. 4- Are there any tours for First Gen students like they have for honors students before they even come to UofSC? No, but when First Gen students do arrive they are paired with faculty member and graduate student who are also first gen.

Added agenda item: **Undergraduate Student Body President:** Patton Myers-The event to be held on September 18th that is getting much news attention has had students looking towards their student leaders for a response. Student leaders have heard the call to provide a safe space on that day during the aforementioned event. It will be a free event, where one is to feel safe, an event of unity and inclusivity. It will be held at Blatt Field at 7pm with free food. The importance of this event, is that students have expressed their anger and being scared of what could happen due to the controversial nature of the speaker/organization/topic of the other event and what could happen because of it. The student leadership events meets students' needs, and is about bringing positive change in a safe and inclusive way. There was a request to attend this event and support students, also encourage students to attend. This is not a protest or counter demonstration in light of the other event, it is an alternative for those who are interested. **Question**: 1-Have you coordinated with others on campus (i.e., Graduate Student Senate)-and yes they have coordinated with various student groups. 2-What will be at your event? Bouncy houses, games, food, a dj, think of a fair atmosphere.

Introduction of standing **Committee Chairs** their committees as well as what each committee focuses on.

Report from Curriculum and Courses: There were only 4 items under review for this current meeting. No questions or discussion and all were approved unanimously.

The Faculty Senate Chair's Report: Just a general update that not much has happened that needs reporting or discussion. Of note was that two spots on various committees were in need of being filled, two have volunteered and if no one is also running or submitting their name then they are approved and the positions are filled at the end of this meeting. No nominations were made. Positions are now filled. Question: 1-Any board approval update on the professional faculty title? Yes, the board has voted and approved the titles as submitted. The State HR is still finalizing the titles as there was one title that was not present and HR needs to create it, but there is unlikely to be an issue, nothing is anticipated.

Announcements: There is a Health and Wellness Expo on September 24th at Russell House and in the Horseshoe. AAUP chapter president gave a call to join the organization and their Fall Kickoff meeting is September 20th at 2pm in the museum of Education Building. Reminder next meeting Columbia Faculty Senate meeting is to be held on 10-9-24 at 3pm.

Faculty Welfare Committee Meeting Report

Date: September 20, 2024

The committee discussed the upcoming Tenure and Promotion Workshop, with the date to be determined based on speaker availability. The workshop will include sessions on teaching, service, scholarship, and the 3rd-year review. Additionally, a breakout group for Tenure and Promotion Reviewer Training is being considered, and a writing component may be added to help faculty with promotion document preparation.

The committee also reviewed the need to clarify the language in the Faculty Manual regarding teaching summaries for tenure and promotion. This will be further discussed in the next breakout session to propose clearer guidelines.

Regarding training for Tenure and Promotion reviewers, plans are underway to develop a program focusing on bias training and decision-making processes. This project will be rolled out gradually, with assistance from relevant faculty members.

The Ad Hoc Awards Committee report summarizing the past year's awards process will be prepared and presented to the Senate in Fall 2024. The Faculty Welfare Survey, conducted every other year, will be linked to the university's Strategic Plan, with efforts ongoing to secure funding for participant incentives in the 2025 survey.

Lastly, the committee noted faculty access to resources such as the Faculty Ombuds Office and the Faculty Civility Advocate.

Next steps include finalizing the workshop details, continuing the Faculty Manual review, initiating reviewer training, and preparing the awards report for the Senate.

Instructor Peer Review Committee Report

- 1. The committee met via email and elected Prof. Pangburn and Prof. Hassell as Co-Chairs for the committee.
- 2. The Co-Chairs met with the Chair of Tenure and Promotion Committee (TNP) and the Chair of the Evaluation Committee, with the following results:
 - a. It is not recommended that the Instructor Peer Review (IPR) seek any formal 5-year review process at this time other than the renewal of contracts since formal reviews are governed by State legislative procedures for Tenure and Promotion faculty only.
 - b. A Faculty Information Form workshop/discussion is in the works for the committees in which a more detailed focus and procedures of the new committees can be communicated starting in Fall of 2025. (The announcement of the planning and time for that workshop is still in the works and will be coming from the Evaluation Committee.)
- 3. IPR will be reviewing one file for the Rank of Senior Instructor later in Fall 2024.

Elliott Springs Writing Contest

Travel Study Proposals



 - o Assisting with the International Mentorship program spearheaded by Dr. Catledge.



• 417 students registered to take the MAP since April 2024. Of the 417 students 261 requested to take it on-line while 129 requested to take the test in-person. Of the 417 students who registered to take the test, 264 students were Lancaster students, 146 were Dual Enrollment students, and 7 were BOL/BLS or Palmetto Pathway students. 113 of the 417 registered students never took the MAP test. The remaining 304 students fell into the follow categories by class reflective of their score: 117 (0-3) MATH 111i, 163 (4-13) MATH 111, 12 (14-19) MATH 115, 4 (20-23) MATH 122, 4 (24-29) MATH 141 with MATH 115, 4 (30) MATH 141.

Enrollment Update

• We entered the fifth and final year of our current grant award on September 1, 2024. At present, we are officially serving 96 out of the 165 students we are required to serve prior to the end of the grant cycle on August 31, 2025. We have another six (6) qualifying students awaiting final selection interviews prior to their being added to our official roster.




USCL Cares Annual Food Drive

LEGISLATIVE UPDATES

Congressional Appropriations

- The House and Senate passed a continuing resolution (CR) last week to avert a shutdown at the close of the Fiscal Year, which ended on September 30. The CR extends government funding until December 20 and passed both chambers with broad bipartisan support.
- After voting on the bill, members of Congress left Washington, returning to their home districts and states for a congressional recess that runs until November 12. One of the first orders of business upon their return will be finalizing FY25 funding.
- The Council for Opportunity in Education (COE) is pushing for a \$20 million increase for Federal TRiO Programs over the FY24 budget in the final FY25 funding package.
