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A Professional Master's Degree in Archaeological Practice

Public or applied archaeology – working for private consulting firms or in the public sector – is the fastest growing field of employment for archaeologists in the US. This degree track at the University of South Carolina is designed to meet that demand. It is structured as a professional degree program with a streamlined course of study, and a focus on experiential learning and building practical knowledge.

What:

- A 30-credit (3-semesters and one summer) professional anthropology degree program
- Focused on the practice of archaeology and its application in the private consulting, historic preservation, and public sector.
- Emphasizing practical knowledge through a focused curriculum with various applied tracks and a practice-based thesis
- The thesis is a hands-on research project focused on some aspect of archaeological enquiry. Faculty mentors help identify research opportunities offered by university faculty, private firms, and other public entities. Thesis research is designed in the first and second semesters, completed in the summer after the second semester, and reported in the final semester.

Who:

- Practicing CRM professionals who want to further their career
- Students whose aim is to obtain a professional position in private consulting, historic preservation, government, or museum settings
- Employees and members of Native American Nations looking to expand their qualifications

Admission:

- B.A. degree from an approved college or university
- Personal statement, writing sample, at least two letters of recommendation
- Demonstrate completion of a field school or 6 months supervised fieldwork

Program of Study:

Students are required to complete a minimum of 24 hours of course work and a master's thesis (6 hours of ANTH 799) for a total of 30 hours. Of these, at least 12 hours must be courses at the 700 level, excluding ANTH 799. Students must successfully pass a comprehensive exam and complete a master's thesis. Specific requirements for the Professional MA Track in Archaeology are listed below:

1. Required Core Courses (12 hours):

- ANTH 720 - the Development of Anthropological Archaeology or ANTH 745 - Seminar in Historical Archaeology
- ANTH 750 -Archaeological Laboratory Analysis
- ANTH 751 - Archaeological Research Design and Analysis
- ANTH 742 - Public Archaeology

2. Breadth (12 hours)

Students must choose at least 12 graduate credits in a discipline or disciplines that complement archaeological enquiry. Breadth courses may include, but are not limited to, geoarchaeology, geophysical prospecting, geographic information systems, historic preservation, museum studies, materials sciences, and Native American relations.

3. Comprehensive Examination

Students must take and pass a comprehensive examination administered by the department.

4. Master's Thesis (6 hours)

Students must complete a master's thesis and six hours of thesis preparation.
