

Funny story on our way to sample the Benguela...



This past April, Dr. Annie Bourbonnais and her Ph.D. student, Darcy Perin, embarked on a... memorable research expedition to Southern Africa. The goal of their research cruise was to investigate N₂O (a potent greenhouse gas) cycling in the northern Benguela upwelling system sediments. Thursday April 11th: The team arrived in Walvis Bay, Namibia. Saturday April 13th: After a bit of a work visa debacle, the R/V Marcus G. Langseth departed the port.



Sunday April 14th: With a quick turnaround, the team collected their first batch of sediment cores. However, shortly after going to bed, a big wave jostled the ship and all the sediment, which was being stored in a fridge, fell out onto the lab floor. Thankfully, time was allocated that morning for additional sediment core deployments. The team had a short spurt of good luck, and were able to finish out their experiments on those sediments (almost immediately after completion another wave hit the ship and the sediment cores fell out of a locked and duct taped fridge).







Tuesday April 16th: The science team was informed, that the vessel's research permit had been revoked, and no more samples could be collected in Namibian waters. The ship was rerouted to South Africa, thus ending an extremely...eventful research cruise.

It's not all bad though, Bourbonnais and Perin were able to participate in safaris in the Okavango Delta, Botswana and Etosha National Park, Namibia (pictured below).




