TECHNOLOGY FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF L2 PRAGMATIC COMPETENCE

Although pragmatics is an essential component of communicative competence (Hymes, 1972), neither textbooks nor most curricula systematically include it. This talk will discuss the components of pragmatics and the importance that pragmatics has for the development of competent L2 speakers. The talk suggests ways of including L2 pragmatics in the curriculum, including several technologies and digital environments, exploring the opportunities that they provide for L2 pragmatics practice and development. Finally, a few important issues of access, identity and agency will be discussed.

SECOND LANGUAGE ACQUISITION (SLA) RESEARCH MAGNIFIED THROUGH THE LENS OF SOCIO-COGNITIVE APPROACHES

From its inception in the 1970s, SLA has attempted to explain the process of second language (L2) learning from a cognitive approach almost exclusively. The obvious reality that L2 learning is both a cognitive and social endeavour prompted attempts to formally integrate social factors in the 80s (e.g., Rampton, 1987); however, it is only in the 2000s, when the cognitive-social breach is discussed in more depth and a call to have more multidisciplinarity and diversity in foci becomes more sustained and urgent (cf. R. Ellis, 2019; Hulstijn et al., 2014; Ortega, 2019; Zuengler & Miller, 2006). In this talk, I will briefly discuss the opportunities afforded by sociocognitive approaches to SLA, and will present recent work designed under those tenets. I will present data from two different target populations: L2 Spanish in higher education in SC, and L2 Kichwa and Kichwa heritage learners in an online learning context in Ecuador. The results shed light on dominating linguistic ideologies that permeate both learning contexts. I will also discuss their impact on L2 teaching, and curriculum design, as well as future avenues of research under the sociocognitive umbrella.
