## Homicide Trials in Japan: The Case of Iwao Hakamada, the World's Longest-serving Death Row Convict

Iwao Hakamada, the longest-serving death row convict in Japan (and the world), is currently undergoing retrial for a murder that occurred in 1966. Initially convicted on a confession obtained through harsh interrogations, Hakamada's case raises significant questions about the intersection of culture and criminal justice in Japan. In this presentation, I delve into the cultural factors influencing interrogation methods and legal proceedings. I shed light on the delicate balance between tradition and reform in Japan's culture and justice institutions. The case provides valuable insights into the challenges of administering justice in a dynamic society like Japan.

Dr. Dimitri Vanoverbeke is Professor of Sociology of Law at the Graduate Schools of Law and Politics, and the Faculty of Law at The University of Tokyo. His research and teaching primarily focus on law and crime in prewar and contemporary Japan.
