Examination of feminist theories and epistemologies from diverse disciplines and intellectual movements, providing an overview of historical developments in feminist discourse. Emphasis on debates surrounding such concepts as gender, identity, difference, power, and embodiment.

TOPICS COURSE: QUEER FORMS

What is the relationship between queerness and form? How may queer cultural and sexual politics inflect and resist, shape or reshape aesthetic form? How do you queer a poetic form? What is a queer essay? How may aesthetic forms shape queer representation? What shapes may queer politics take in cultural texts? This course will create a space for exploring these questions by focusing on a specific set of literary and film texts, mostly post 1972 and from the U.S., Ireland, and Brazil. We will think about form in multiple ways—literary and aesthetic forms, but also structures, kinship, bodies, performances, temporalities, formality (and breaking form).

The course will draw on a range of theorists, including Caroline Levine on form, Sara Ahmed on queer use and queer emotion, critical theorists on queer time (José Esteban Muñoz, Jack Halberstam, Elizabeth Freeman), and the recent work of Ramzi Fawaz on queer forms of 1970s gay and lesbian cultural politics.
