The wait was over for everyone, and for Smith, the pressure was finally off.

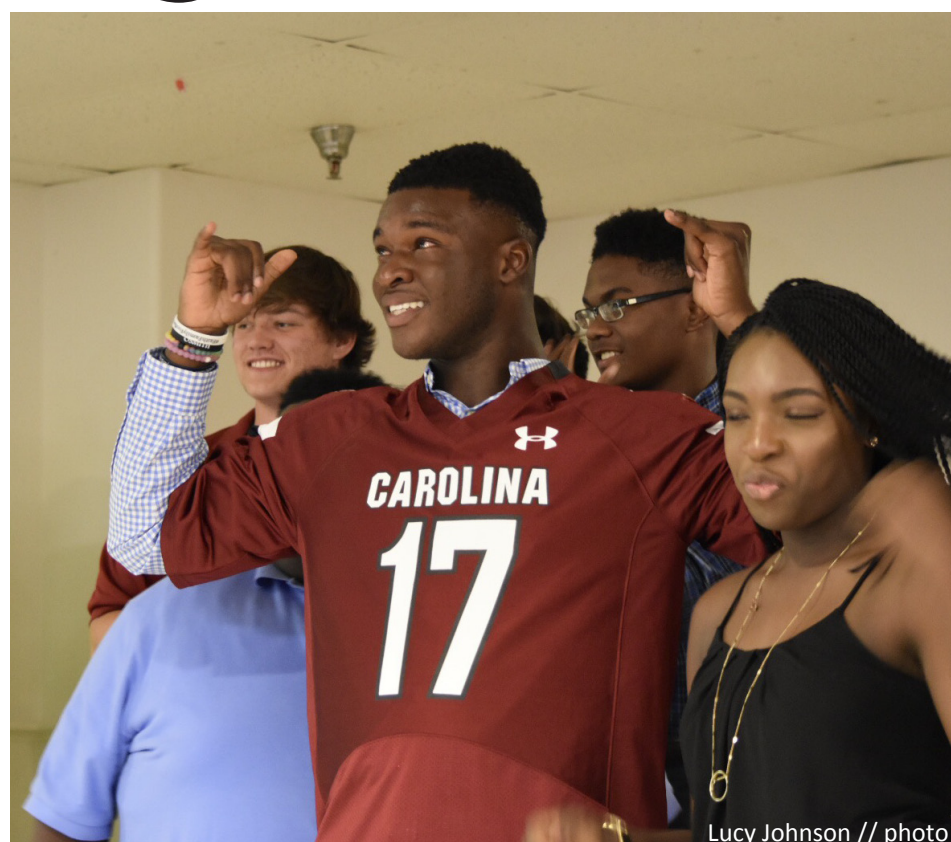

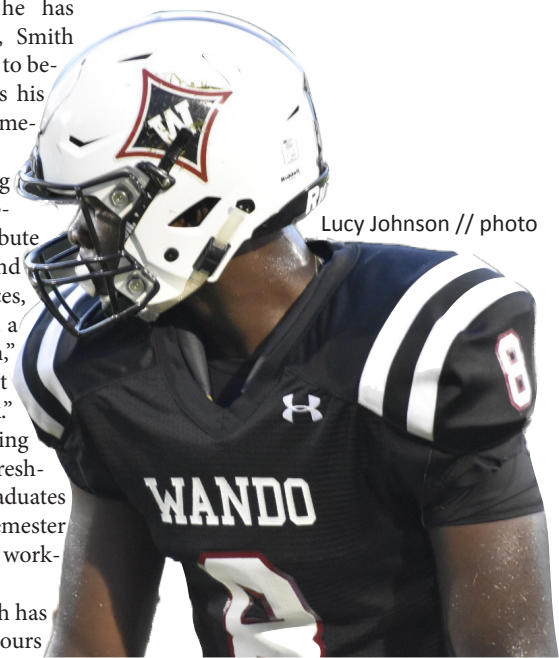
